

New York State Archives' Records in 1609 Exhibit at the State Museum

In celebration of the 2009 Hudson-Champlain Quadricentennial celebration, Dutch colonial records from the New York State Archives are on display for the State Museum's 1609 exhibition. This exhibit examines some of the myths about Henry Hudson, the Native People he encountered, and the Dutch period in New York State by showing the legacies left by these groups to the residents of the state and nation. The exhibit will continue through Sunday, March 7, 2010.



First State Agency Records Management Exchange to Focus on Email

The New York State Archives, in conjunction with the New York State Division of the Budget, sponsored the first Records Management Exchange on July 30th, 2009. The Exchange is a new initiative designed to bring together state agency records management stakeholders to discuss issues and possible solutions and resources. The topic for this first meeting was e-mail retention and disposition policies and procedures. A lively audience of over 50 records managers, legal counsel, and information technology staff volleyed a number of ideas back and forth over the course of two hours brainstorming and sharing experiences. The meeting was widely regarded as a success by participants. The Archives plans to hold additional Exchange meetings in the future.

New York State Archives Wins Grant to Develop Security Tools and Workshop

The New York State Archives and the State Historical Records Advisory Board (SHRAB) have received a grant for \$62,632 from the National Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC) State

and National Archival Partnership (SNAP) to develop a security workshop and tools for New York's historical records community.

The grant will consist of two projects. The basic project, which will begin October, 2009, will develop web-based products on the SHRAB website including best practices for safeguarding collections; recommended policies and procedures for collection security and institutional accountability; strategies for reporting, searching for, and retrieving lost, stolen, or alienated records; and a brochure targeted to the public, dealers, and collectors on identifying and reporting government records in the marketplace. The collaborative project, scheduled to begin in March, 2011, will include partners, who will develop and administer an archival security workshop for New York's archival and records management community to be given in nine different regions of the state.

Schenectady Museum Receives IMLS Conservation Bookshelf

Treasured objects and artifacts held by the Schenectady Museum will be preserved for future generations with help from the IMLS Connecting to Collections Bookshelf, a core set of conservation books and online resources donated by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). IMLS has now awarded almost 3,000 free sets of the IMLS Bookshelf, in cooperation with the American Association for State and Local History (AASLH).

"The Schenectady Museum is thrilled to receive the Conservation Bookshelf from the Institute of Museum and Library Services," said Schenectady Museum & Suits-Bueche Planetarium Executive Director Kerry M. Orlyk. "It will be a valuable resource to preserve our vast archival collections documenting an important history of innovation and technology."

The Schenectady Museum Archives is one of the premier collections on the history of technology and its impact on society. With over 1.5 million images, the collection's strengths are many and include photography and film, radio and television film and images, and materials relating to marketing of consumer products as well as medical, power generation and the turbine. Collections from General Electric and the American Locomotive Company (ALCO) give a vivid picture of those companies' international impact. Audio recordings in the collection include rare radio recordings, Edison wax cylinders, and an Edison tinfoil recording from

1878 with over 1.5 million images that date from the 1850s to the present.

"When IMLS launched this initiative to improve the dire state of our nation's collections, we understood that the materials gathered for the Bookshelf would serve as important tools for museums, libraries, and archives nationwide," said Anne-Imelda Radice, Director of IMLS. "We were both pleased and encouraged by the overwhelming interest of institutions prepared to answer the call to action, and we know that with their dedication. artifacts from our shared history will be preserved for future generations."

The Schenectady Museum will receive this essential set of resources based on an application describing the needs and plans for the care of its collections. The IMLS Bookshelf focuses on collections typically found in art or history museums and in libraries' special collections, with an added selection of texts for zoos, aquaria, public gardens, and nature centers. It addresses such topics as the philosophy and ethics of collecting, collections management and planning, emergency preparedness, and culturally specific conservation issues.

The IMLS Bookshelf is a crucial component of Connecting to Collections: A Call to Action, a conservation initiative that the Institute launched in 2006. IMLS began the initiative in response to a 2005 study it released in partnership with Heritage Preservation, A Public Trust at Risk: The Heritage Health Index Report on the State of America's Collections. The multi-faceted, multi-year initiative shines a nationwide spotlight on the needs of America's collections, especially those held by smaller institutions, which often lack the human and financial resources necessary to adequately care for their collections. In addition to the Suits-Bueche Planetarium, which has the only GOTO Star Projector in the entire Northeast, the Museum houses the GE Photograph collection, with more than 1.6 million prints and negatives; an archival collection with more than 3.500 cubic feet of historic materials; and more than 40,000 objects relating to the history of science and technology. The Museum also offers the only FETCH! Lab in the entire Northeast, with hands-on activities patterned after the popular PBS show FETCH!, in collaboration with WHMT. During 2008, the Museum welcomed over 44,000 visitors, including students, researchers, business leaders, tourists, and many others.

Researching NY Conference

The University at Albany's Department of History is preparing for the 11th annual Researching New York Conference. The organizers are preparing a wonderful program of panels, papers, workshops, roundtables, exhibits, documentary, and media or multimedia presentations on any facet of New York State history -in any time period and

from any perspective. The conference will be held at the University at Albany on November 19th and 20th, 2009.

To mark the upcoming **Hudson-Champlain** Quadricentennial, Researching New York's 2009 conference theme will be 400 years of Exploration: the Hudson-Champlain Corridor and Beyond. We especially invite proposals that explore and interpret not only the exploits of Henry Hudson and Samuel de Champlain, but the many kinds of exploration that have taken place in the ensuing 400 years of New York State's rich and diverse history-including consideration or how we remember, celebrate, interpret, and commemorate historical events.

Researching New York brings together historians, researchers, archivists. museum curators, librarians, graduate students, teachers, Web and multimedia producers, and documentarians to share their work on New York State history. • State Agency and Local Government Workshops

Far in advance of the opening of most schools, Government Records Services and State Agency Services have already begun their second session of State Agency and Local Government Workshops. The current schedule runs through the middle of December (only four months away!) and is available on the Archives website:

Documentary Heritage Program (DHP) Workshops

Each DHP region offers standard workshops and more specialized training, such as roundtable forums and brown bag lunch meetings, as well as special exhibitions. National Archives and Records Administration (NARA)

NARA has educational offerings through its Records Management Training Learn Center. They can be browsed at: https://nara.learn.com. Onsite classes, for the Northeast Region, are offered in Boston, Buffalo, New York, and San Juan and the Virgin Islands (unfortunately, no classes currently scheduled there for December). The Center also offers Webinars, by region, as well as virtual classes, including a basic records management course.

Society of American Archivists (SAA)

SAA continuing education opportunities pick-up in the fall, but only a few are scheduled in the Northeast, including Boston and New York. You can find a schedule and more information on Continuing Education programs at:

• AIIM The ECM Association

Offers free Webinars on Wednesdays, usually one or two Wednesdays a month. You have to register in advance, but don't have to be a member of AIIM, and the Webinars last an hour, usually scheduled 2-3 pm EST. The topics deal with the "technologies used to capture, manage,

store, preserve, and deliver content and documents related to organizational processes". They also provide access to past webinars, but they do require a log-in and registration for that as well. ARMA International

These include On-line Courses and Web Seminars. Current listings include courses on organizing files and records, voice recognition and RIM, and a legal perspective on e-mail, voice mail and instant messaging, as well as a course on the HIPAA Privacy Rule, and other privacy issues. You can also find links to local ARMA chapters, including some in New York which occasionally sponsor events or workshops (September 23, in Albany, William Saffady will give a workshop on "Identifying and Managing Vital Electronic Records").
