# Geoffrey Williams Retires

Geoffrey Williams retired after 27 years at the University at Albany on September 2, 2014. To recognize his outstanding accomplishments and his commitment to the University community, a reception was hosted on Thursday, August 21, in the M.E. Grenander Department of Special Collections and Archives.

Geoffrey Williams' accomplishments reflect a long career of outreach to the University at Albany students, faculty, and alumni, as well as helping community organizations in the Capital District preserve their history. Since coming to the University in 1987, Geoff consistently dazzles students and alumni with his factual knowledge of 170 years of University history and traditions.

As the institutional memory for the University, Geoff served as a major source of historical information for administrative and academic offices throughout campus, including the President's Office and Office of Communications & Marketing, as well as students and faculty. He shared his knowledge by writing a regular column, "Ask Geoff," for the UAlbany Magazine, and conducted bus tours, walking tours, and programs for alumni, student, and community groups.

Geoff has worked with community members to collect and preserve the historical records of African Americans in the six-county greater Capital District of New York. As co-chair of the Capital District Black History Project, he was responsible for the preservation of records of area African-American organizations at the archives of UAlbany.

Among his hundreds of talks and presentations to the community are lectures to the Washington Park Neighborhood Association and many others. Geoff served on the New York State Historical Records Advisory Board, New York State Local Government Records Advisory Board, and Documentary Heritage Program Advisory Committee.

The University at Albany thanks him for his years of service and wish him well in his future endeavors.

# Researching New York 2014 Identities in New York: Imagining, Constructing, Exploring

**RESEARCHING NEW YORK:** Perspectives on *Empire State History* will be held on November 20 & 21, 2014 at the University at Albany, SUNY. Researching *New York* brings together historians, researchers, archivists, museum curators, librarians, graduate students, teachers, Web and multimedia producers, and documentarians to share their work on New York State history. We look forward to your participation at this year's Conference.

The Conference Program will be available shortly; meanwhile, we are pleased to announce featured events for the 2014 conference. On Thursday November 20<sup>th</sup> **Richard Norton Smith** will talk about his new book. On His Own Terms: A Life of Nelson Rockefeller. Fourteen years in the making, On His *Own Terms* is the first complete biography of Nelson Rockefeller. Drawing on thousands of newly available documents, some two hundred interviews, and Rockefeller's unpublished reminiscences, Richard Norton Smith recreates this complex life, both personal and political. A political and presidential historian, a public intellectual regularly appearing on C-Span and

other public affairs programs, Richard Norton Smith is the former head of 6 presidential libraries. His book, "Thomas E. Dewey and His Times," was a finalist for the 1983 Pulitzer Prize. Sponsored by the New York State Writers Institute and the University at Albany History Department, this featured conference event is free and open to the public.

On Friday November, 21<sup>st</sup>, Carnegie Mellon University historian Lisa Tetrault, University will discuss The Making of a Myth: Seneca Falls Unraveled, which is the story of how women's rights began in 1848, at the women's rights meeting in Seneca Falls, New York, is a cherished American myth. But where did that story come from? Who invented it? And for what reasons? Unraveling that story by investigating its roots, which lay fifty years after the convention, Tetrault invites us to rethink the relationship of Seneca Falls to the evolution of modern women's rights activism. Lisa Tetrault is the author of The Myth of Seneca Falls: Memory and the Women's Suffrage Movement, 1848-1898. She specializes in U.S. women's history, memory, and social movements.

Also on Friday November 21st there will be a performance of *The Workers of the Erie Canal: They Built* 

# *America*. Written by **Maggie Mancinelli-Cahill**, Artistic

Director of the Capital Repertory Theatre, this innovative drama examines the origins of the Erie Canal, a miraculous waterway that transformed America from a burgeoning country into a great nation. Sourced from more than 35 historical records-and created to bring professional theatre and history to school audiences—They Built America features the politicians, farmers, merchants, and laborers who came north to build the Canal. Collections Repair for Smaller Libraries & Archives Introduction to Paper Collections & Basic Repair Procedures

The Capital District and surroundings have countless libraries, archives, museums and historical societies with amazing collections that are used for all kinds of research and programming. Books are circulated, maps are scrutinized, photographs are handled, and prints and ephemera are exhibited. But what about the physical condition of some of these materials? What can be done to stabilize holdings so they can be safely handled?

This two-day introductory workshop will help staff of small to medium size libraries, archives and historical societies become familiar with materials and basic methods for safe and effective paper repair. The focus is on techniques for general collections that do not require expensive equipment and supplies.

#### Caring for Scrapbooks An NEDCC Webinar October 27<sup>th</sup>, 2-4 PM

Scrapbooks are unique artifacts that combine personal and historical records, often representing family moments alongside local and national history. This webinar will discuss the issues to consider in providing the best level of care for scrapbook collections. The webinar introduces the structure of scrapbooks, types of materials commonly found in them, methods of attachment, and the implications for preservation and conservation. Low-cost, in-house preservation approaches are discussed.

Audience: This introductory webinar is designed for those with limited training in this subject, and those who are interested in a refresher. Staff and volunteers working with archival records and historic collections are encouraged to attend.

About the presenter: As a Preservation Specialist at NEDCC, Eva Grizzard conducts preservation needs assessments, presents workshops and webinars, and answers preservation inquiries from institutions and individuals. In her previous position as Assistant Archivist at the **Rockefeller Archive Center** in Sleepy Hollow, NY, she gained in-depth experience in processing and maintaining a variety of collection materials. She has earned both an M.S. in Library and Information Science with a concentration in Rare Books and Manuscripts and Special Collections, and an Advanced Certificate in Archives and Records Management from the Palmer School at Long Island University.

About the Program: The twentieth and twenty-first
